BRIEF BACKGROUND - Harmonization

In order to culture Shellfish in BC, must have approvals/authorizations:

- > Shellfish Aquaculture Licence (Fisheries and Oceans Canada, DFO)
- Navigation Protection Program (NPP) Approvals (Transport Canada)



Harmonization - Memorandum

Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) –

- Canada-BC agreement on aquaculture management
- sets out the roles and responsibilities of the different governments
- harmonize and synchronize respective Federal and Provincial decision making processes and criteria.
- approved in 2010 but is currently under review and may be updated







Harmonization Committees

There are multiple committees in which the 3 agencies, Province of BC Ministry of Forrest Lands Natural Resources and Rural Development (FLNRORD) and Ministry of Agriculture, Transport Canada (TC) and DFO participate

Management Committee (AMC)

executive committee, holds overall decision making authority and resolves inter-agency issues;

Director of Aquaculture Committee (DAC)

director-level forum that ensures strategic coordination among agencies;

➤ Harmonized Working Group (HWG)

operational-level forum; works to support strategic coordination among agencies; and

Project Review Team (PRT)

operational-level group principally responsible for tracking and advancing shellfish applications.



Harmonization

FLNRORD, TC and DFO work closely together to harmonize many aspects of aquaculture.

Multiple areas or sub committees are being discussed and formed to improve harmonization.

Some include but are not limited to:

Project Review Team (PRT)

Review all applications (shellfish, finfish, aquatic plants) to determine whether they can be accepted for review.



Improving Harmonizing in other areas

Licensee Amendments/ Assignments:

name changes of licence/tenure holders

Diligent Use:

review the use of tenures/licences to ensure they are meeting BC diligence use requirements

Unlicensed Facilities:

review expired tenures/licences/approvals





required with every application

Shellfish Aquaculture Debris Management Plan Guidance

This document provides guidance to provincial shellfish aquaculture tenure and licence holders (aquaculture operators) on the information that should be included in a debris management plan. The debris management plan is a document for the aquaculture operator to implement, but it does not absolve the operator from complying with any of the requirements under the DFO licence, provincial tenure contract, or any other municipal, provincial or federal authorization.

Debris:

- Pieces of aear, equipment, and/or infrastructure that has become lost, scattered, or discarded in the
- Any persistent solid material that is manufactured or processed and directly or indirectly, intentionally or unintentionally, enters into the marine environment.

Contents of a debris management plan

Section 1 - Gear, Equipment &/or Infrastructure

- · Identify, describe, and inventory:
 - each type of gear, equipment, and/or infrastructure that will be used on site.
- · For each item/group of items list their expected lifespan and the probability of each item becoming
- · Identify the highest risk items for becoming debris and mitigation measures to be implemented to prevent them from becoming debris.
- List the end of life destination for each type of gear once it is degraded or otherwise no longer
- . Describe where any debris from your site may travel to and why (e.g. beaches vs. sea floor). Please provide rationale for your assessment.

Section 2 - Debris Management Protocols

- Describe how you will reduce and manage debris generation.
- . Create an inspection and maintenance checklist outlining what is to be checked and what info will be recorded by those doing the inspection.
- Describe protocols for the inspection and maintenance of gear, equipment and/or infrastructure including the frequency (e.g. every week, every month, etc.).
- The inspection and maintenance protocols should be specific, including:
 - o the actions that will be taken (such as regularly scheduled clean-ups of tenure areas &
 - o the frequency of maintenance and inspections;
 - o how you will document the actions taken; and,
 - the process to assess the adequacy of your debris management protocols.
- Outline your debris complaint response protocols. i.e. if you receive a public complaint regarding debris generated from your site.

Section 3 - Implementation Plan


- . Describe the steps you will take to implement the debris management plan (e.g. develop standard operating procedures, staff training plan, etc.).
- Describe how you will document the actions taken by you or your staff described in the debris management plan.

Section 4 - Contact Information

 Define instructions for how members of the public may contact you to report debris, including proposed signage or other site or equipment markings.

Other Harmonized Improvements

- Harmonized Decisions/Authorizations:
 coordinate submission of decisions and authorization / issuance after
 each agency conducts independent full reviews (approve or deny)
- Shared File Location:
 all agencies now have access to one shared location. Constant communication on any harmonized application







Applying to the Navigation Protection Program (NPP)


Transport Canada's Navigation Protection Program (NPP) helps keep Canada's navigable waters open for transport and recreation. The program administers the <u>Canadian Navigable Waters Act</u>. The <u>Wrecked</u>. <u>Abandoned or Hazardous Vessels Act</u>, and parts of the <u>Canada Shipping Act</u>. 2001. In 2019, the <u>Navigation Protection Act</u> was amended and renamed the CNWA to better reflect its purpose. <u>Changes in the Act</u> were aimed at strengthening environmental protection, as well as protecting waters on which the public has the right to travel (navigable waters).

Under the <u>Canadian Navigable Waters Act</u> (CNWA), owners of works who propose to <u>construct, place, alter, rebuild, remove or decommission</u> works that are in, on, over, under, through or across any navigable water may be required to apply for an approval to Transport Canada (TC), or seek authorization through the public resolution process.

Before you submit an application or a notification through this system, you must determine if:

- · Your project may be categorized as a major or minor work;
- Whether your work will be located on a waterway listed on the <u>schedule</u> of the CNWA; and
- Whether your work will interfere with navigation or not.

Depending on the result of this determination, the process will be different. If you are unsure which type of application or notification is required for your work, we suggest that you use the project review tool.



Applying to TC

- Complete the application and submit.
- Receive an automatic email confirmation that your application has been received.
- Your application will be assigned to an NPP officer once processed by administration
- You will receive an email, or letter, with the NPP officer name and informing you that you may advertise.
- In the ESS, open up your application and enter the dates your advertisement will run in the paper


Pursuant to Paragraph 7(2) of the said Act, Applicant's Name, has deposited with the Minister of Transport, on the on-line Navigable Waters Registry (or Common Project Search (CPS): http://cps.canada.ca/), under the Navigation Protection Program File number# xxxxx-xxxxx and the CPS registry number ####, a description of the following work, its site plans:

(Nature and status of work) in, on, over, under, through or across (Name of navigable water) at (Name of place where work is to be located) in front of lot number (or at the foot of such a street, etc).

Comments regarding the effect of this work on marine navigation can be sent through the Common Project Search site mentioned above under the Comment section (search by the above referenced number) or, by sending your comments directly to the Navigation Protection Program Pacific, Suite 820 – 800 Burrard Street, Vancouver, B.C., V6Z 2J8 if you do not have access to the internet

However, comments will be considered only if they are in writing (electronic means preferable: NPPPAC-PPNPAC@tc.qc.ca) and are received not later than 30 days after the publication of the last notice. Although all comments conforming to the above will be considered, no individual response will be sent.

• The registry will open for comment on the date you entered as the publication date of public notice.

30 day comment period is required

- Joint advertising documents will have been sent out with the PRT acceptance letter from FCBC, which will now unify FLNRORD and TC's advertising requirements.
- Proof of advertising is to be sent to the NPP officer to verify compliance with the Act.
- Once the NPP officer has processed your application, you will receive an approval of the works with conditions that will mitigate your impact to navigation.



APPROVALS – Authorizations to impact navigation

- Previous approvals had an expiry date of 5 years. If you have an expired approval, or an approval that is about to expire, you need to reapply through the ESS for a new approval
- If you have modified your site and need an amendment to your approval, you need to reapply for a new approval
- If you have never applied to TC, you have no approval authorizing your work, you need to apply for an approval.
- If you have changed ownership of your infrastructure, you need to notify the NPP office to have the records updated.


9.5.3 Diligent Use

Diligent use = compliance with the management plan and maintaining a satisfactory level of use/production.

Diligent use can be assessed any time, but two key areas where further harmonization efforts that relate to diligent use are underway:

- Debris, derelict, and unlicensed sites
- Tenure Replacements

How to apply for a provincial tenure replacement for aquaculture

Assemble and submit the application package:

Completed infrastructure table from the harmonized application form
(Part 1 – Section F)
shellfish & aquatic plants
finfish

Up-to-date top view operational diagram (shellfish or aquatic plants) or approved cage array diagram (finfish);
Recent site photos
Debris management plan (shellfish & aquatic plant tenures only)
